Dear Mother:-

In looking over my papers the other day, I ran across the enclosed copy of the Gospel Herald. If you have time, I wish you would read the article which I wrote in regard to the Colored Sanitarium at Nashville. This was sent out to nearly ten thousand different people and it has been an astonishment to me that no effort was made by any one what so ever to try to hold this institution together, after making such an appeal as this. To be frank with you, Mother, it is one of the difficult experiences of my life time and I cannot understand it. This was the only sanitarium for the colored people in the world and although it was imperfect, yet, certainly it was much better to keep this going than to allow it to go all to pieces as it did do. I cannot understand it.

Tuesday night Emma will start for Battle Creek and I shall start for Berrien Springs. I shall spend a couple of days there and then go on to Boulder, Colorado and spend a month or six weeks, finishing up the work upon the manuscript of my book.
