Dear Brother:-

I enclose in this a statement of my business relations with the leading merchants and leading business men of Nashville. I thought it might be well for you to receive copies of the absolute letters received from them.

As to my financial standing I will say just a few words. When I moved out to this place I took on obligations which were very serious, and which, from a business standpoint could not be justified in any way whatever. Of course, I was glad to come out into the country into this location for two reasons: (a) Because it is more healthful than nearer Nashville. (b) Because my entire force of office help lived at this place and I was in desperate need of help to carry forward the work. And beyond all this was the active effort that Mother made to have me leave the city and go farther into the country. I think nothing else would have induced me to dispose of my property in Nashville as I did and invest in the country. As a result of so-doing I became financially involved to a large amount, and a few months ago it seemed almost hopeless that I could ever be able to pull through with the difficulties that surrounded me. I began, however, not so much in the way of borrowing money as to conduct business transactions which would place money into my hands. This I succeeded

in doing beyond my wildest expectations, and in a way that was a marvel to Elder Bollman and others closely connected with me in my work. These transactions were not so much in the way of borrowing money, as previously stated, as in selling properties which were valuable, and in making deals without decreasing my assets. I also sold my Nashville property although at a very serious loss amounting to fully \$4000. As a result of all this, within six or eight months, I decreased my liabilities between ~~\$1200~~^{\$12,000⁰⁰} and ~~\$1100~~^{\$14,000⁰⁰} also disposing of some of my assets.

At the annual statement of last January it was ascertained that although I had met with heavy losses in the selling of my Nashville property, the burning of my barn, the sinking of the boat, etc., I had still held my own financially during the year, and the books show today a net worth, above liabilities, of about \$24,000 and with liabilities something less than that amount. I have, however valuable property to represent both my own worth and the amount of liabilities. I can, therefore, show a net worth of between three and four times as much as the S. P. A. and with only about one-fourth or one-fifth as great liabilities. My property also would be convertible for more nearly its inventory value than that of the Publishing House.

My standing in Nashville is good, and with one or two business transactions which I hope to close soon, I hope to be in position to attend to my work without the wearing care and constant difficulty that has attended my business during the past year or two.


I supposed a short time ago that I had disposed of the food factory and of a ten acre farm with a house on it, which adjoins it. This would have placed me on the "sunny side of easy street", but these negotiations fell through. Now I have a plan at work by which I hope to sell a formula and special machinery for

manufacturing Dixie Kernel to a food factory in the North and I expect to net from this sale \$4000 or \$5000. This sale will detract very little from the value of the food plant here, and will enable me to sell it for some less money, but will bring me much larger returns personally.

Now you will perhaps wonder why I did not telegraph you at Los Angeles, as you desired, in regard to Spanish Coming King. We attempted to send a telegram to you, but they replied they could not promise delivery under three and one-half days; hence, I considered it useless to attempt it. I therefore, wrote you at Sanitarium, Calif., for I gathered from your letter that you should return there almost immediately. I did not get the proofs of the Spanish in time to send them the other day, but I send them in the mail today, but there are two chapters where the proofs have been sent to Mexico, and they will not be ready to send until the returns come from Cavenniss.

It will be a great relief to have this book completed at the Pacific Press, and so have the care entirely removed. I have all I can attend to, and there is really little money in work of this kind.
