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About Mrs. White's twin sister, Elizabeth. She was with Ellen in the Advent hope in the Millerite preaching of 1840 to 1844. She, with Ellen, was disfellowshipped from the Methodist Church. She did not move forward in the acceptance of the Sabbath truth in 1846 as did her Sister Ellen. I am quite certain that she returned to the Methodist Church. She was a very earnest woman and died in the mid 1890's. Sister White went to see her whenever she had occasion to do so. She occasionally wrote to her, and she carried on quite well planned missionary efforts sending her the Signs of the Times and the Review and Herald and the Watchman and her books, and the correspondence between the two sisters was free and easy as you would find between two Christians. There was no antagonism, but there is a decision which each individual must make as you have pointed out in your letter, and Elizabeth did not choose to make such a decision.

One time speaking of her experience, Sister White said that Elizabeth could not somehow grasp the simplicity of faith. Elizabeth married a Mr. Bangsønd, so far as I know, lived her entire life in the Portland area.

I am always interested in hearing from you, Brother Johnson. May the Lord bless you in your work there.
