August 21, 1882

Dear Brother [W.C.White]:

. . . "This has been an exceptional year with me as I chose to pay the fare of my children over and have made no charge on the mission for their expenses of board or clothing. I trust they are going to be of use in the mission. Delmer has set all the type on No. 7 and 8 of the Supplement. Mary tries to make herself useful "typing" the Supplement, wrapping papers, and assisting in letter writing, etc. . . .

"I do not think it right to receive any more than it do (\$12.00 per week) for my time. A little interest money has helped considerable. . . .All we have is the Lord's, and it should be in the cause in some way before the work closes up." . . . (J.N. Loughborough letter file)

Egbert C. Loughborough was a nephew of J.N. Loughborough. At the Pacific Press he was always called "Uncle Bert." --(from Pacific Press Impressions), a series of articles about Pacific Press Pioneer workers.)

LOUGHBOROUGH--"Died in Mt. View, Cal. May 31, 1907, Anna Mariah Loughborough, nee Driscol, wife of Elder J.N. L. aged 67 yrs. . . .In 1898 she went to Europe with her husband, . . .returning to California in 1899. For four years they lived in Oakland with Elder Loughborough's daughter, Mrs. Ireland. . . .Elder Loughborough and the daughter are the only near relatives living."--RH June 20, 1907

LOUGHBOROUGH--"Died in Chicago, Oct. 8, 1894, Delmer N. Loughborough, only son of Elder J.N. Loughborough, aged 30 years and 2 months. . . .In 1886 he was united in marriage to Maria, daughter of Randall Steward, of this city. . . .Delmer contracted typhoid fever . . . and . . .died . . .while asleep. . . .A stricken family, which includes wife, parents, sister, and other relatives, mourn his untimely death."--RH Oct. 30, 1894

Loughborough, William K.--Born, Victor New York Aug. 5, 1827, died at Glendale, California, Nov. 21, 1912, aged 85 years. . . .It was he who encouraged his brother, J.N. Loughborough, to engage in preaching the advent doctrine. In 1847 he was married to Eliza Norton. To them were born three sons and two daughters. The surviving son, Bro. E.C. Loughborough, now laboring at Pacific Press. (See Impressions, re Uncle Bert).

Oldest daughter, Mrs. C.F. Marvin and husband, with Glendale San.

Youngest daughter, Mrs. Winnie Kelsea, several years editor of YI.

The J.N. Loughborough's had a baby daughter who died in infancy. On January 2, 1860, James and Ellen White were called to the Loughborough home, as the baby was dying. In E.G.W. MS 1, 1860, she is described as the "only child." The Whites had had a season of special prayer on January 1, and Mrs. White had quoted Luke 18:16 in regard to the child's case. The little girl died on Jan. 2, while the Whites were present.
